Bonanza Flat

What if the Guardsman Pass road was opened year round between Park City and Salt Lake City?

Traffic, congestion, air and noise pollution could come streaming down through Empire Pass right into the heart of Old Town Park City.

Don't like that idea? We have a unique opportunity to stop it.

Park City has a \$38 million deal to buy and preserve Bonanza Flat, a 1,350-acre parcel rich in scenery, wildlife and wildflowers along Guardsman Pass. You see this land from the top of Empire at Deer Valley and the top of McConkey's at Park City. The view is of aspen groves, alpine lakes, and iconic peaks of the Wasatch Mountains.

Many people, enjoying the view, thought this was forest service land. But it's not. In fact, developers have eyed it for years and even drawn up development plans and proposals.

If it were to be developed, the Guardsman Pass Road, which is now closed in the winter, would be opened for year round traffic.

Open Space is the heart of our community. This was proven when City residents voted in November to pass a \$25 million dollar bond to purchase the Bonanza Flat property, should it become available.

And now, it has.

But \$25 million isn't enough.






