839 Woodside is a T/L cottage that has undergone minor alterations. The T/L cottage, also known as a crosswing, is one of the main three house types built during the historic Park City mining era. The most major change made to the house was the extension of the porch. The lower level garage was also added, but built by the drawing of the 1941 Sanborn map and may have been built much earlier in the historic period. The cross gable roof is sheathed with standing seam metal with a brick chimney at the peak of the stem wing. The walls are clad with drop-novelty wood siding and the concrete foundation can be seen where the house

meets grade and in the garage area. The windows appear to be the same as is shown in the early tax photo, with a tall central pane flanked by casements with three upper lights placed together in both the front gable end and another in the porch area to the right of the door. There is a small one-over-one double hung sash window in the upper gable of the cross-wing, and may be original to the house, but this remains unverified due to that area being obscured in the early tax photo. The door is a wood frame and panel door with a multipaned upper light. The porch has been rebuilt and is covered by a shed extension of the main roof which previously extended only to the edge of the cross-wing, and now extends beyond. The porch roof is supported by square wood posts with a simple railing between. A stair leads up from the sidewalk to the porch. A railroad tie retaining wall runs along the sidewalk until it meets the stair. The overall form and materiality of the building remains intact and the building retains its historic value.

This house was built while the property was under the ownership of the Park City Townsite Corporation, and may have been used to house workers up until the time of its purchase by James Forsythe in 1890.

James Forsythe was a stationery engineer who worked for a mine. He lived on Norfolk Avenue with his wife Katie, and their two children. It may be that he rented this house out at that time, but as no addresses were included on the census of that year, it is impossible to tell who lived there. He sold the house in 1907 to S.S. Lane.

Simon Lane was a miner who was born in Ohio. He lived in the house with his wife Mable ad their son Ronald during the 1910 census. They sold the house in 1911 to Robert Johnson. There were several men by that name living in Park City at that time, and it is difficult to determine which of them owned the house. It was sold a short time later to Lillie Tretheway in 1913.

Lillia Tretheway was an English immigrant who came to the U.S. in 1907. She worked in Park City as a dressmaker, and lived in the house with her son William during the 1920 census. She sold the house in 1923 to Bessie Wyckoff.

Bessie Wyckoff lived at 919 Woodside Avenue, with her husband John and their four children, as noted on the 1930 census. John was an assayer for a mine. They rented out the property, and during the 1930 census, it was occupied by C. D. Waltman and his family. He and his wife were born in Tennessee and he worked as a pumpman for a mine. During the 1940 census the house was occupied by Floyd McAfee, his wife Almeda and their son. He worked as a lineman for the power company. The McAfee's purchased the home from Bessie Wyckoff in 1942, but then sold it to Virgil Street in 1945. They had moved away from Park City by 1946.

Virgil Street lived in Park City with his parents at the time of the 1940 census. He worked as a clerk at that time, and was in the navy during WWII. No other information could be found on him. The property has had several owners since that time and is currently owned by the 839 Woodside LLC.









Figure 1: Aerial view showing the location of 839 Woodside Avenue. (ESRI 2020)
